

Historical Series with Dr. Schanher

Our Continuing Saga

In August 1799, a group of six to twelve families from Kentucky, traveling the river systems, led by Simon Kenton and John Humphreys, arrived near the confluence of the Mad River and Lagonda Creek (Buck Creek). They moved to the high ground where the modern-day Masonic Home stands in the west end of Springfield and built a fort to protect them from Native Americans as well as fourteen log cabins. This became the first permanent settlement in what would become Clark County.

James Demint, considered by most local historians past and present to be the founder of Springfield, arrived with his family in 1799, holding a deed for 640 parcels of land procured from a real estate agent John Cleve Symmes of Cincinnati. A Kentuckian by birth, Demint was no stranger to wilderness wanderings. Upon arriving to the same confluence that Kenton did, Demint followed the Lagonda Creek eastward until he found a suitable place to settle. He and his family built a double log cabin above the cliffs that now overlook the Springfield Art Center and Buck Creek. Today, a large rock with an inscribed plaque situated in the front yard of the former William Toy Board of Education building on College Avenue, between North Fountain Avenue and North Limestone Street, marks the approximate position of Demint's cabin, the first house built within the current Springfield city limits.

Our next adventure into the Clark County and Springfield story will look into those who made a difference.



Celebrating Black History Month – February

In February, we will honor and highlight several African American individuals and families interred at Ferncliff. Check our social media pages through the month for more articles and stories. These selected persons are an integral part of our city's rich history.

Broadwell Chinn was born a slave in Lexington, KY around 1855. His large family came to Springfield in the 1870's when his father, William, opened a grocery store on Center Street.

Chinn attended primary school, but was denied admission to public high school due to his race. The principal and several teachers took exception and tutored him allowing Chinn to qualify for a high school diploma. He applied to Wittenberg in 1874, but again, a vote of the student body denied him admission. Wittenberg's Board of Directors reversed the vote allowing him admission.

Mr. Chinn, became the first African American to graduate from Springfield High School and Wittenberg College. He further broke racial barriers as a member of the Clark County Bar Association.

On September 11, 1889 Broadwell died from consumption. He is buried in Ferncliff in Section F. When we found there was no stone to mark his grave, many Ferncliff employees contributed to cover the cost of adding a marker to honor his life.

Today, Wittenberg awards the Broadwell Chinn Scholarship to students of diversity. His legacy lives on at the university and in our community.
