





Honoring Our Heroes Ferncliff's Veterans War Memorial Park

s the summer heat slowly wanes and a chill creeps into the air, we find ourselves anticipating the arrival of autumn. There is something enchanting about this season, a time when nature undergoes a spectacular transformation.

As the trees shed their green hues, they don an artist's palette of reds, oranges, yellows, and browns. Every leaf paints a vivid picture of nature's beauty, and a leisurely walk-through Ferncliff Cemetery becomes a journey through a living work of art.

Amidst the falling leaves and cooling temperatures, we also mark a significant day in November—Veterans Day. It's a time when we come together as a nation to pay tribute to the brave men and women who have defended our nation throughout its history. Their sacrifices, dedication, and unwavering commitment to protecting our freedoms deserve our deepest gratitude and respect.

Our heroes deserve year-round recognition, extending beyond Veterans Day. Therefore, in 2015, after nearly a year of planning and dreaming, Ferncliff's Veterans War Memorial Park became a reality. The memorial, a permanent place of remembrance, would feature nine granite tablets inscribed with the pivotal events from each of the historical conflicts. Ferncliff's Board of Trustees wholeheartedly approved the plans, providing the momentum to move forward. A thoughtfully selected location, adjacent to the World War II section, provided a seamless transition, ensuring the heroic stories of Clark County's brave men and women are always remembered. In the fall of 2015, Ferncliff Cemetery proudly dedicated the park, "Lest We Never Forget."

Ferncliff is much more than a final resting place to 80,000 souls; it is a living testament to the courage and sacrifice of those who served in these nine distinct conflicts represented in stone:



- The American Revolution (1775-1783): As we walk through these hallowed grounds, let us remember the brave souls who fought for the birth of our nation. Their sacrifices laid the foundation for the freedoms we cherish today.
- The War of 1812 (1812-1815): Ferncliff holds the stories of those who defended our young nation during this often-overlooked conflict. Their patriotism and resilience echo through the ages.
- The Civil War (1861-1865): Here, amidst the solemn beauty of these grounds, we reflect on the profound sacrifices made during the Civil War. We pay tribute to both Union and Confederate soldiers, recognizing the shared bond of service.
- The Spanish-American War (1898): We honor the valor of those who answered the call during this pivotal chapter in our history. Their dedication to preserving the nation's integrity is a testament to their character.

Historical Series with Dr. Schanher

Dr. Paul W. "Ski" Schanher III has been a devoted member of the Springfield Cemetery Association and serves as the President of the Board of Trustees. "Ski" is a retired, local dentist and is an active and respected member of the historical community in Springfield and Clark County.

The article below is next in the series written by Dr. Schanher.

People Are Coming

When founding father James Demint and surveyor John Daugherty platted Springfield in March 1801, people began to settle in the area. They built log houses, opened small businesses, and established a school that also served as a church. For protection from unexpected confrontations with the Native American population, the early settlers built a large two-story log house to serve as a blockhouse. Springfield was growing.

In the spring of 1804, a couple from Virginia, Walter and Mrs. Smallwood, arrived in Springfield. Existing records do not mention her name. They purchased a lot and built a comfortable residence on the south side of Main Street. For many years Mr. Smallwood was the only blacksmith in town. A woman of practical reasoning skills, superior intellect, impeccable manners, and socially aware of the need to improve the community, Mrs. Smallwood became one of the original members of the first Methodist society organized in Springfield. Her gift of humble heartfelt prayer endeared her to the congregation.

Mr. and Mrs. Smallwood became the parents of six children, three boys and three girls. Growing in the grace and the knowledge of the gospel under Mrs. Smallwood's discipleship, their children became leaders in their religious peer groups. As the children matured and began to move on with their lives, in 1852, the Smallwood's followed their children to Missouri. They lived the remainder of their lives in Missouri before passing away, Mrs. Smallwood prior to the Civil War and Mr. Smallwood in 1869.

The Reverend Saul Henkle was the first minister of the gospel to settle in Springfield, Ohio. He, his young wife, and their two-month-old child traveled from Hardy County, Virginia in the spring of 1809 to begin their ministry in frontier Springfield. Pastor Henkle was an ordained preacher of the Methodist Episcopal Church but eventually became affiliated with the newly organized Protestant Methodists. He served his newly-adopted community by setting the example and "living to promote the moral and religious welfare of the people in the village." He unashamedly preached the Word of God, officiated every marriage, and solemnly conducted every funeral. Pastor Henkle served the citizens of Springfield for twenty-eight years.

In 1827, pastor Henkle published a religious paper, called The Gospel Trumpet, that was distributed throughout the town. He also wrote editorials for the local newspaper, called the Western Pioneer. In 1830, the citizens of Springfield elected him as Clerk of the Court, an office in which he efficiently administered the business of the court.

In September 1825, his wife died. He later remarried in 1829, describing his second wife as "a most excellent woman." Pastor Henkle died in Springfield in 1837, at age 55. He lies at rest in the old Springfield Burying Ground, gravesite unknown.



Gathering Momentum: The Springfield Cemetery Association Holds Annual Meeting

As we approach our 160th Anniversary, the 159th Annual Meeting of the Springfield Cemetery Association was conducted on August 8, 2023. This outstanding gathering underscored our Association's unwavering dedication to the oversight of the business affairs, vision, and progress toward innovation in the cemetery industry.

The Springfield Cemetery Association, the governing body of Ferncliff Cemetery and Arboretum, consists of 25 dedicated members from our community, with nine members elected to serve as Trustees. This year, we were pleased to have 21 members in attendance, along with key Ferncliff staff.
